Upon moving to Oklahoma, Lisa immediately got involved with OKRA and the NRC to learn more about recycling in her community. An OKRA board member, she is a passionate sustainability advocate, and teaches the importance of reducing, reusing, refusing, repairing, and recycling daily.
